


### **POLLUTANTS LIKE**

### BEST PRACTICES TO PREVENT STORMWATER CONTAMINATION

#### **CLEANING PRACTICES**

- Wash water must be disposed of in a sink or floor drain.
- Wash food trucks at car wash facilities and not adjacent to storm drains.
- Dispose of liquid waste down a sink or garbage disposal, not in the dumpster or storm drain.
- Sweep outdoor areas regularly and dispose of debris in the trash. Only use drycleaning methods when cleaning trash containers or outdoor areas.
- Contain spills using absorbent material, then sweep and dispose in trash or wipe up excess.

#### **DISPOSAL PRACTICES**

- Keep dumpsters in an enclosed area with lids closed. If possible, lock the enclosure.
- Never put excess food waste down a sink, toilet, or floor drain. Instead, put food waste in a tied trash bag to keep dumpsters free of food debris.
- Properly inspect and clean grease trap interceptors on a routine schedule. Never position grease bins near stormwater flow paths or inlets.
- All pressure-washing runoff must be captured and disposed of in a sanitary sewer drain.

## OTHER SOURCES OF POLLUTION
